Chairwoman Gossage and members of the Committee

Thank you for the opportunity to appear in support of HB 2453, the Dentist & Hygienist Compact. I represent ADSO, the Association of Dental Support organizations. ADSO is a non-profit organization that supports its member dental support organizations that provide business and operational support services to dentists and dental clinics so that they can focus on patient care and expand access to quality dental care. DSO’s register with the Kansas Dental Board as dental office administrative services providers. Think of them as providing a broad array of non-clinical dental office support, including access to state-of-the-art equipment, continuing educational offerings, peer-to-peer networking, HR, compliance assistance, billing and insurance, etc. Dentists enjoy the services of DSOs because it allows them to spend more of their time practicing their profession.

ADSO has a particular focus on access to dental care and removing statutory and regulatory barriers to dental care access. Unfortunately, access to dental care is lacking in too many states – particularly in economically disadvantaged and rural areas. This is particularly true in Kansas, which is in the bottom quartile nationally: 39<sup>th</sup>, according to RTI (Research Triangle Institute) data. Topeka, e.g., has experienced a double digit (19%) decline in the number of dental offices over a recent 10-year period (2011-2021, according to RTI data).

Note the stark reality of the overall reduction in dental establishments from 2011-2021 illustrated by the attached map sourced from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

ADSO has been one of the organizations, in addition to state & national dental and hygienist organizations, that has been involved with the Council of State Government’s efforts to address the issue of access to care. The DDH Compact is a project funded by the Department of Defense (DoD) as it also assists military families on the move. We have with us today by Matt Shafer with CSG who has graciously made himself available to us to explain and support their Dentist and Hygienist Compact, which ADSO had introduced as HB 2453.

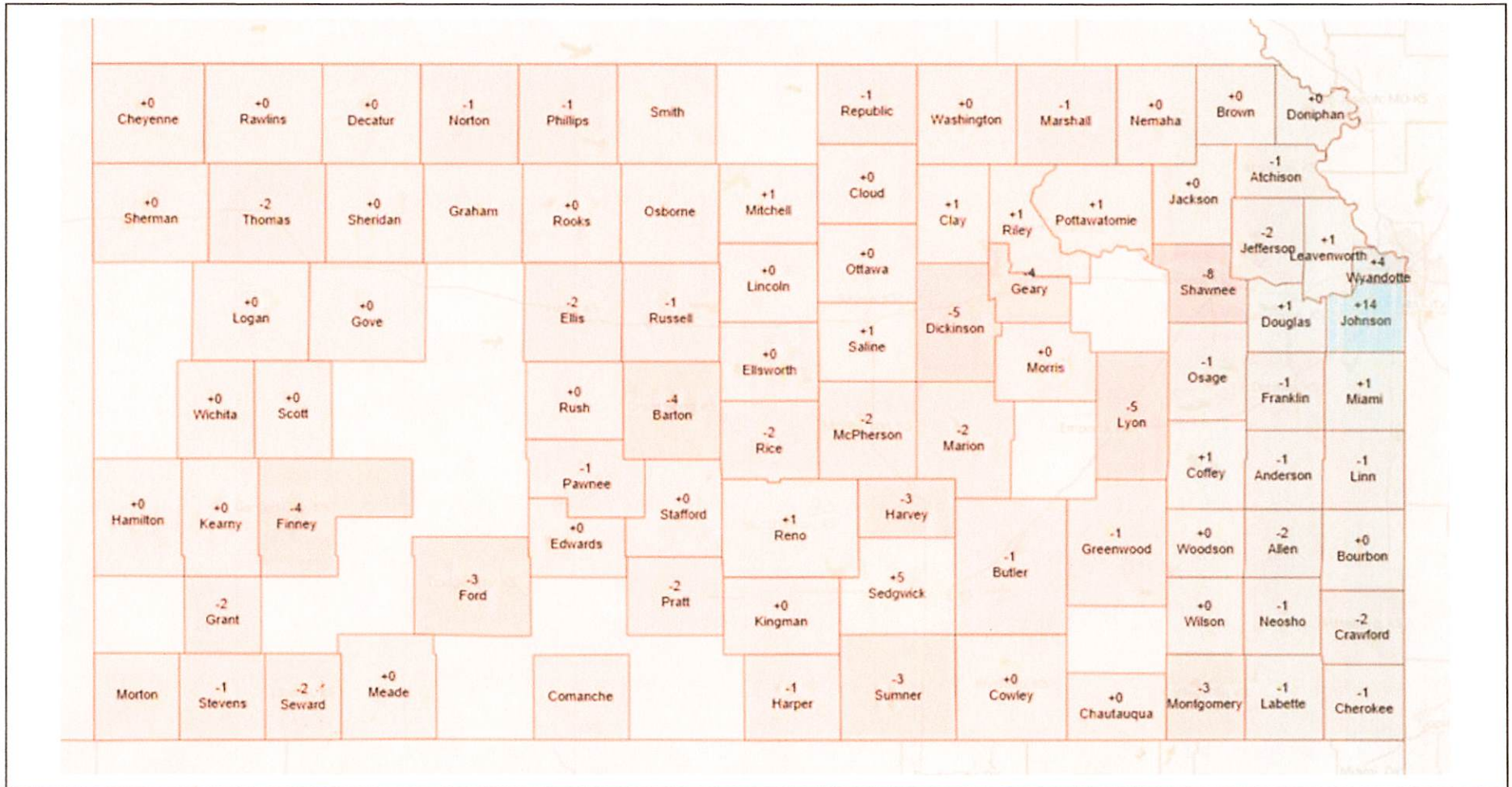

HB 2453 received unanimous support in the House.

The Compact is similar in form and function to the eight occupational licensing compacts that Kansas is already a member of.

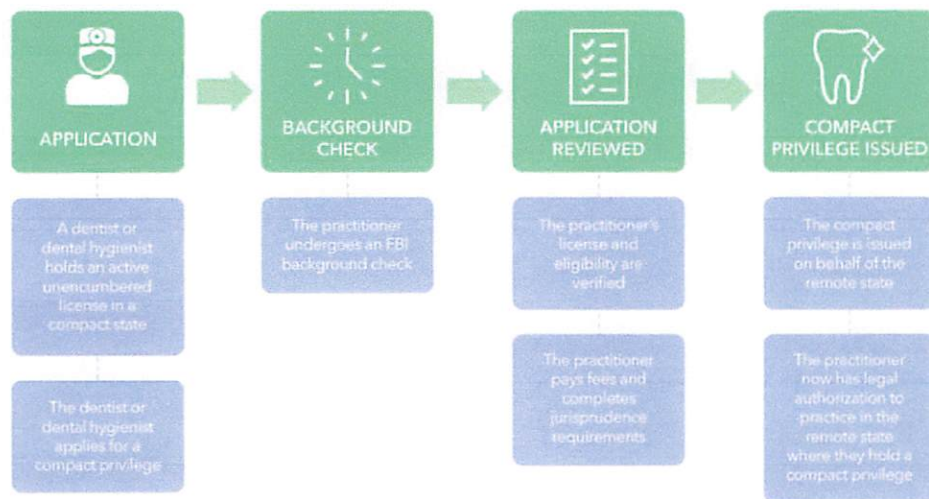


# DDH Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact

## What is the Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact?

The Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact is an interstate occupational licensure compact. Interstate compacts are constitutionally authorized, legally binding, legislatively enacted contracts among states. This compact enables licensed dentists and dental hygienists to practice in all states participating in the compact, as opposed to them obtaining an individual license in every state they want to practice.

## Who can use the Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact?

A dentist or dental hygienist is eligible to participate in the compact if they have:

- An active, unencumbered license in any state participating in the compact.
- Passed the National Board Examination or other exam accepted by the compact commission.
- Completed a clinical assessment.
- Graduated from an education program accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation.
- No disqualifying criminal history.

### BENEFITS OF DENTISTS AND DENTAL HYGIENISTS LICENSING COMPACT FOR LICENSEES:



Facilitates multistate practice.



Enhances license portability when changing state of residence.



Expands employment opportunities into new markets.



Improves continuity of care when patients or providers relocate.



Supports relocating military spouses.



Reduces burden of maintaining multiple licenses.

### BENEFITS OF DENTISTS AND DENTAL HYGIENISTS LICENSING COMPACT FOR REGULATORS:



Reduces administrative burden.



Facilitates practitioner mobility during public health emergencies.



Ensures retention of jurisdiction over practitioners working in their state.



Expands state licensure board cooperation on investigations and disputes.



Enhances public safety through shared data system.

### BENEFITS OF DENTISTS AND DENTAL HYGIENISTS LICENSING COMPACT FOR STATES:



Promotes workforce development and strengthens labor markets.



Expands consumer access to highly qualified practitioners.



Preserves state sovereignty.



Increases collaboration among states.

## What's Next?

Interstate compacts take time to develop and implement because of the necessary coordination among state legislatures, state regulatory boards and the compact commission.

The Council of State Governments (CSG) will facilitate a stakeholder review process to receive input and feedback on the draft of the model legislation. The goal is for this legislation to be ready for introduction during state 2023 legislative sessions. Legislatures must enact the Dentist and Dental Hygienist Compact model legislation in order for their state to be a participant.
