**SUBJECT:** Fiscal Note for SB 371 by Senate Committee on Federal and State Affairs


In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning SB 371 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

SB 371 would add a missing person who is 18 years of age or older and who has an intellectual disability to the Silver Alert Plan.

The Office of the Attorney General, the Kansas Highway Patrol, the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services, and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation indicate that SB 371 would have no fiscal effect on the agencies.

The League of Kansas Municipalities indicates that SB 371 would have a fiscal impact on cities, as law enforcement agencies would experience increased costs associated with enforcement and training. The Kansas Association of Counties indicates that SB 371 would have no fiscal effect on expenditures unless there was a significant increase in missing adults with intellectual disabilities.
