Testimony on H.B. 2152

We are testifying in favor of this Bill in order to help protect the rights of those who have a legitimate need for an Emotional Support Animal (ESA). The increasing abuse of that right by those who wish to circumvent "no pet" policies by obtaining online certificates using false or misleading information could eventually cause the Federal Government to reevaluate, or even eliminate that right.

Requiring a Kansas licensed physician, psychiatrist, social worker, or other mental health professional who has met with the patient in person, is sufficiently familiar with the patient and the disability, and is legally and professionally qualified to make the determination is a common sense way to guarantee that the applicant is properly evaluated, given the care and respect that they deserve, and to screen out those who are simply trying to beat the system for their own selfish purposes.

Attached you will see a very small sampling of the multitudes of offers to be certified for an ESA taken straight from the internet just a few days ago. I have highlighted important legitimate information, offers to instantly or within 48 hours get your certificate for a "nominal" fee, and even a discussion about whether an applicant should, or should not think about getting what the author refers to as a "weird" ESA.

Again, I wish to emphasize that we are NOT in opposition to Emotional Support Animals. We feel that there is a very legitimate need by some people in our communities, and with this proposal we seek to protect their rights by making sure that those in need are properly diagnosed and cared for by certified professionals, and to weed out those who are attempting to abuse the existing Federal law.

Proposed Kansas Assistance and Service Animal Integrity Act

An Act

Creating the Kansas Assistance Animal Integrity Act; providing definitions for assistance animal and disability; creating requirements for documentation of the need for an assistance animal in housing; and providing for the offenses of misrepresentation of entitlement to assistance animal and misrepresentation of an animal as assistance animal.

The Legislature of the State of Kansas hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Short Title

This act shall be known as the Kansas Assistance Animal Integrity Act.

Section 2. Definitions

The following words and phrases when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Assistance animal." An animal that qualifies as a reasonable accommodation under the Fair Housing Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, or similar local law. This term shall include an emotion support animal when such animal qualifies as a reasonable accommodation.

"Disability." A physical or mental impairment, which substantially limits one or more major life activities, (or as defined in K.S.A. 44-1002 and amendments thereto).

Section 3. Subject to the following a landlord shall provide a reasonable accommodation to a tenant making request for an assistance animal:

- (a) A landlord who receives a request from a person to make an exception to the landlord's policy prohibiting animals, or limiting the size weight, breed, types or number of animals on the landlord's property, because the person requires the use of an assistance animal, may require the person to produce reliable documentation of the disability and disability-related need for the animal unless the disability-related need for an assistance animal is readily apparent or known to the landlord.
- (b) If the person seeking a reasonable accommodation for an assistance animal has a disability, which is not readily apparent, that person shall provide written evidence:
 - 1) describing the person's disability-related need for the assistance animal;

- 2) from a Kansas licensed physician, psychiatrist, social worker, or other mental health professional who:
 - (i) has met with the patient in person;
 - (ii) is sufficiently familiar with the patient and the disability; and
 - (iii) is legally and professionally qualified to make the determination.
- (c) Where the disability related need for an assistance animal is not readily apparent or known to the landlord, the landlord may require the requesting party to submit on an annual basis the written evidence required in subsection (b).

Section 4. Immunity

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Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, a landlord shall not be liable for damages or injuries caused by a person's assistance animal permitted on the landlord's property as a reasonable accommodation to assist the person with a disability pursuant to the Fair Housing Act, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 or any other relevant federal, State or local law.

Section 5. Misrepresentation of the entitlement to assistance animal.

- (a) A person commits the offense of misrepresentation of entitlement to an assistance animal if the person intentionally:
 - 1) misrepresents to another that a person has a disability or disability-related need for an assistance animal in housing; or
 - 2) makes materially false statements for the purpose of obtaining documentation for the use of an assistance animal in housing.
- (b) A person who violates subsection (a) of this section commits a Class A misdemeanor.
- (c) If a person commits the offense of misrepresentation of entitlement to an assistance animal the landlord may proceed with any action allowed under K.S.A. 58-2564 or K.S.A. 58-25-120.

Section 6. Misrepresentation of animal as assistance animal.

- (a) A person commits the offense of misrepresentation of an animal as an assistance animal if a person intentionally:
 - 1) Creates a document that misrepresents an animal as an assistance animal for use in housing:
 - 2) provides a document to another falsely stating that an animal is an assistance animal for use in housing; or
 - 3) fits an animal, which is not an assistance animal, with a harness, collar, vest or sign that the pet is an assistance animal for use in housing.
- (b) A person who violates subsection (a) of this section commits a Class A misdemeanor.

(c) If a person commits the offense of misrepresentation of an animal as an assistance animal the landlord may proceed with any action allowed under K.S.A. 58-2564 or K.S.A. 58-25-120.

Section 7. Severability.


The provisions of this act are severable. If any word, phrase, clause, provision, section or subsection of this act, or the application thereof is found unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable or invalid, such portion shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this act.

Section 8. Effective date

What is an Emotional Support Animal (ESA)?

An emotional support animal is a dog, or cat, or other pet that helps alleviate symptoms of an emotional or mental disability through companionship and affection.

Also called assistance animals, ESAs aid your day-to-day life with structure and care.

Appropriate Emotional Support Animals

There is no set rule of what animals can or cannot be considered ESAs; however, many airlines, landlords, and, most importantly, licensed mental health professionals will not allow or write an emotional support animal letter for a pet who does not provide you with the proper care you need for an mental/emotional condition.

The animal must be beneficial for your health and not put you or anyone else in harm's way.

Overall, most dogs and cats are recognized as appropriate emotional support







An ESA Letter from CertaPet provides:

- Recognition that you are a patient on a case-by-case basis under a licensed mental health professional's care for mental or emotional disabilities.
- Verification that you are significantly limited by an individual disability, such as depression or a similar condition, affecting your mental well-being.
- Prescription for an emotional support dog (also known as a companion dog), or other support animal, as a necessary reinforcement for your mental health within 48 business hour

Once you receive the letter, you are free to use it whenever you travel or live with your animal.

What NOT to Do When Getting an ESA

More and more people today abuse the use of emotional support animals. This can be anyone including:

- Individuals who bring their exotic pets to the airport requesting emotional support animal accommodation
- Websites and services claiming they offer emotional support animal certification

 or registration
- Those who bend the truth in order to fly or live with their pet for free

If you think your emotional and/or mental disability qualify for an emotional support animal letter, then there are 4 important items to make sure to NOT do in the process of becoming an ESA owner.

1 - Don't lie to your therapist

Though this rule goes without saying, please understand emotional support animals are not ordinary pets and trying to get one without a specific disability only hurts real ESA owners in the long run.

2 - Don't Fall for Scams

One major reason individuals do not take the need for an emotional support animal serious is due to the fact there are sites and services out there that claim they certify/register the pet. You end up paying for non-legitimate documents that do not hold up in any court of law, nevertheless airports or accommodations.



A major repercussion of falling for ESA scams is not just denied access when traveling or living with your assistance animal.

The punishment for misrepresentation of an emotional support animal or any assistance animal for that matter (service dog/animal) could be:



3 - Don't go to websites offering instant approval

When a site offers an instant approval upon submitting a questionnaire or application, there is a good chance the service is a scam.

In order to properly become an ESA owner, you first need to fill out assessment, which will be reviewed by an LMHP. They will determine if you could benefit from an emotional support animal.

4 - Don't receive assistance from a provider who does not offer any follow-on service or care

Getting an emotional support animal is not a one time occurance. You will need a provider who offers follow on care service after you receive your letter.

For example, many airlines require additional documentation and forms alongside the ESA letter. With follow on service, you will receive the assistance you might need to travel or live with your ESA.



Thinking you might not be suited for a traditional emotional support animal (ESA)? If a dog or cat doesn't fit exactly with your needs, you might want to consider getting one of the more weird emotional support animals as a pet. There are pros and cons to getting an exotic ESA versus a typical animal. Here's a breakdown of questions you should ask yourself if you want to know whether you should get a weird emotional support animal.

What do I specifically need my ESA for?

The first aspect you need to think through is why you're getting an emotional support animal to begin with. It's important for you to consider your mental illness diagnosis (PTSD, anxiety, depression, etc.) and what your particular symptoms are. Determining why you need an ESA can help you narrow down your search for what type of animal would be best suited to your situation. Ask yourself if you'll be needing a constant companion (which could rule out some exotic animals that aren't permitted on flights or in businesses) or if you'll be needing an ESA who can cuddle up with you and show affection (which crosses animals like reptiles off your list). Taking the time to ponder these questions is essential, since you'll be wanting to make sure you're getting an ESA that fits your needs – and not all exotic animals will fit the bill.
