Hello! My name is Mindi Blokzyl. I am currently a 1st grade teacher in Clearwater, Kansas. I have been teaching for 11 years. Upon reading and researching the new proposed bill I felt obligated to email you to share my opinion. The bill I am writing in opposition of is Bill HB2662 also referred to as the Parent Bill of Rights.

One of things that concern me about the bill is having to have all of the materials submitted by July 1st. If you have spent any time within the classroom you will quickly realize no two classes are the same. The teacher needs to have the ability to be flexible with what and when we teach the materials. The students may be quick to grasp something, but then struggle with something else and need more time to learn it. I do not want to feel locked in a certain time frame caused by this bill. I want to be a good teacher and teach what is needed and when it is needed. Another big concern for me is this really worth the time and money to pursue? At any time a parent can ask me or my school what and why I am what I am and I would love to share it with them. Why take this out of my direct hands and make it part of a bigger system? I believe this will take away the interaction that is desperately needed within the school systems.

I encourage all parents to be involved with the educational process and would love it if they and myself had meaningful conversations.
