Representatives:

In my review of the proposed maps for Districts 1, 2 and 3; you are all charged with a great responsibility for considering the following important and relevant facts:

Wyndotte and a typical District 1 county have nothing in common <u>culturally and ethnically></u> Wyndotte is diverse-48% non-Hispanic whites. 26% African-American, 22% Latinos 21.7%, and 2% Asians compared to 98% non-hispanic white population of District 1 counties. Wyndotte and a typical District 1 county have nothing in common <u>economically.</u> Wyndotte's economy is based on automobile manufacturing and distribution, railroads, and bakery products compared to agriculture, forestry, and fishing & hunting in most District 1 counties. Wyndotte and a typical District 1 county have little in common <u>infrastructurally.</u> Wyndotte is metropolitan compared to rural.

Wyndotte and a typical District 1 county have little in common <u>demographically</u>. Wyndotte has a youthful population. 40% from 18 to 44 compared 27%.

The <u>difference</u> between Wyndotte County and a typical District 2 county <u>is almost as stark</u> as between Wyndotte and a typical District 1 county.

On the other hand, *Wyndotte and Johnson County* which presently are in the same District 3 <u>have much more in</u> common.

Wyndotte and Johnson County are <u>adjacent and part of</u> the same contiguous metropolitan area.

Wyndotte and Johnson counties have much in common culturally and ethnically > Johnson County is nearly as diverse with 86% non-hispanic white, 7% Hispanic, 4% Black or African American, and 4% Asian.

Wyndotte and Johnson counties are <u>demographically</u> <u>similar</u> with a youthful population with 40% and 41% from 18 to 44.

The question begs; Who are you there to "Represent?"
