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Grant	Senate Bill No. 303 prohibits the restricting of visitors for residents of county homes for the aged or patients in county hospitals and would permit residents and patients to waive city, state or federal restrictions on visitors that are imposed to control transmission or prevention of an infectious disease. We oppose Senate Bill No. 303. The COVID-19 virus has placed counties in the unique position of protecting their resident's welfare during a pandemic. Protecting employees and vulnerable residents and patients has been a top priority for our hospitals and care facilities. Visitors improve a patient's or resident's wellbeing and we need to finds ways to allow loved ones to visit safely, but this legislation is over-reaching. It impacts a county's ability to respond to public health emergences and may impede on the rights of others seeking to avoid exposure to infectious diseases, potentially creating liability for a county.

Morton	Senate Bill No. 303 will have costs for extra staffing and protective measures like; PPE, physical environment protections and sanitization, space conversion for social distancing, screening of visitors and after visit testing.Additionally, Senate Bill No. 303 doesn't address the ability of facilities to establish protections regarding visitation hours, number of visitors, relationships of visitors or even specified visitation days. Limits to visitation days can be important to accommodate staffing requirements that may be needed to address resident/patient movement and access controls. Limitations on the number of visitors will be necessary for many of the same reasons, in addition to private room sizing.
